CA\$H Theatre Grants

Fall 2023 CA\$H Theatre Grant applications are open! CA\$H Theatre Grants are available to individual theatre artists, collaborative teams, and small, profession-ally-oriented theatre companies with operating budgets no greater than \$100,000.

There are three funds available: CA\$H Creates, CA\$H Performs, and CA\$H Sustains. Theatre companies, collaborative teams, and individual theatre artists are eligible to apply for CA\$H Creates and CA\$H Performs, while CA\$H Sustains is specifically for theatre companies.

CA\$H Creates is a \$2,500 grant that supports the development of artistic projects or capacity-building projects not directly tied to a fully-produced performance of a piece.

CA\$H Performs is a \$5,000 grant that supports fully-produced performances of artistic projects that are open to the public, or projects that support the creation of multiple works by multiple artists.

CA\$H Sustains is a \$5,000 grant that supports the general operating costs of a Bay Area theatre company. Sustains applications will only be open once per year, during the fall granting cycle.

All applications must be submitted by Monday, November 6, 2023 at 5 PM PST.

The Threat of An Inclusive American Theatre

MAINSTAGE

Nataki Garrett is kicking off TBAConnect with her brilliant insight! As a trailblazing theatre artist, administrator, director, producer, playwright, educator, activist, and mentor Nataki Garrett brings a unique perspective to what it means to be a theatre artist today. Speaking from her leadership and artistic experience she will share her vision for what it truly means create organizations that are both artists driven and artists centered.



Nataki Garrett (she/her)

Nataki Garrett is a changemaker, trailblazer, and nationally recognized artist and artistic leader. She was the first executive artistic director and the sixth artistic director of the Oregon Shakespeare Festival and the first Black female in this role. As such, she was the first female and person of color in the country to lead a \$44M fully producing theater company. Her accomplishments included helping to save OSF during the pandemic closure by raising \$19M from government, foundation, and individual sources. Nataki used her platform to organize the Professional Non-Profit Theater Coalition, a national effort to advocate for the Shuttered Venue Operators Grant, which provided an unprecedented \$15B of federal funding during the pandemic for live-performance venue operators, performing-arts organizations, theatrical producers, and more.

While at OSF, Nataki created and produced "Quills Fest," the firstof-its-kind fully immersive digital event at the intersection of XR (extended reality) and theater. She also served as executive producer for the 2022 Sundance award-winning film You Go Girl! and the film Ashland, both directed by Shariffa Ali. Nataki's work as a multi-hyphenate artist can be experienced across film, VR, and live theater. Among other honors, she has received the Bronze Telly Award (2023) and the OMPA Creative Innovation Award (2022), was the first recipient of the Ammerman Award for Directing (2019), given by Arena Stage, and was named a United States Artist Fellow (2022).

Raised in Oakland, Nataki comes from a family of artists, educators, and civil-rights organizers. Her vision is to support artists; to manifest innovation; to inspire creativity; and to ensure the future of performance by centering artists as thought leaders and changemakers who transform culture. Nataki can be regularly read, watched, or listened to across regional and national news media.

The Importance of Arts Journalism in this Theatre Crisis

Z BELOW STAGE

Artists and critics – do we need each other? Join David John Chávez and Jeffrey Lo in conversation about what arts journalism brings to our current theatre crisis. How do theatremakers relate and respond to theatre critics in our work? Press coverage is often considered a lifeline to the performing arts, but how does it support theatres in practice? From shaking off a bad review to the journalistic process of writing about performance, bring your listening ears and your burning questions to these experts for discussion and insight. If you are interested in the role arts journalism should – or should not – play in this critical moment, don't miss this session!

David John Chávez is a theatre critic and reporter who writes regularly for the San Jose Mercury News, KQED, American Theatre Magazine, and the San Francisco Chronicle. He is one of five co-founders of Substrate Arts Magazine, a Bay Area arts and culture publication, chair of the American Theatre Critics Association and a two-time juror for the Pulitzer Prize for Drama ('22-'23), serving as jury chair in 2023.

Dani currently leads the makeup department for Terror Vault, San Francisco's premier immersive haunt experience. She also designs sets and makes props for various companies in the Bay.



Tech Basics for Actors and Directors

BEHIND MAINSTAGE

Looking to up your game as director? Want to become your lighting designer's new favorite person? This session is for you! Bay Area designer and technician Jax Steager will walk you through the basic terminology and functions you need to communicate with lighting designers, set designers, and technicians. This session will help directors understand exactly what to ask for, calculate more accurately how much work is involved in each request, and collaborate more effectively with designers and technicians. Actors will come away with a better understanding of their work environment and learn the practical skills and mechanics of theatrical storytelling.


