Land Acknowledgment

We are here in celebration at Z Space for the Theatre Bay Area conference, TBAConnect: Undeniable Creativity. We'd like to take this moment to recognize and acknowledge that we are on the unceded ancestral homeland of the Ramaytush Ohlone, which encompasses the San Francisco Peninsula. The Ramaytush Ohlone are the original inhabitants and Indigenous stewards of this land. They are still here and have never ceded, nor forgotten, their responsibilities as caretakers of this land, as well as for the people who reside in their traditional territory.

Now, I'd like you to take this moment to open your hearts and minds to a Native way of thinking about land. Ownership of land is a European settler's concept. Native people don't look at land as an object to possess, but rather land is looked at as an Elder or a relative that you have great responsibilities, commitments, and obligations to take care of. To take care of your mother, Mother Earth. Natives don't just live **on** the land; we are **of** the land, with an interconnectedness of traditions and endless futuristic possibilities.

So, today as you participate in TBAConnect at Z Space, as you walk through the homeland of the Ramaytush Ohlone, through theatres, halls, and streets of the San Francisco Peninsula, I invite you to adopt a Native way of thinking about the land you stand on today; that you are not just on this land but rather you are of this land.



Accessibility

The venues are wheelchair accessible.

For a low-fragrance environment, we ask that attendees refrain from using perfumes, colognes, and other fragrances on the day of the event. <u>Learn more about the impact of chemical fragrances and how to reduce your usage.</u>

We're asking everyone at TBAConnect to help reduce the risk of transmission. To prevent everything from negative health impacts to the cancellation of performances, it's important we all work together to reduce risk where we can.

The **Mary Mason Memorial Lemonade Fund** is a confidential resource for theatre practitioners with critical illnesses, conditions, or injuries who are in need of supplemental financial assistance.

Since 2000, Theatre Bay Area has distributed over \$100,000 to theatre workers in need through the Lemonade Fund. Much of it is made possible through generous donations by fellow artists.

Giving to the Lemonade Fund

Join the hundreds of theatre artists and other supporters who have made taxdeductible donations to the Lemonade Fund. (Please note: A donation cannot be earmarked for a specific person. Monies will be distributed equitably among all qualified applicants.)

Theatre companies and producers are also encouraged to host Lemonade Nights at their shows to raise money and awareness for the fund. Interested in hosting a Lemonade Night at your upcoming show? Who is eligible to apply to the Lemonade Fund?

Any resident of the San Francisco Bay Area who has been an active participant in the theatre community — regardless of the income derived from that work — in at least two of the past five years and is currently living with a critical illness, condition, or injury is eligible to apply for the program. Applicants can request \$250, \$500, or \$1000.

Due to a high number of applications this fall, the **Lemonade Fund is currently closed for 2025.** We are currently fundraising to replenish the fund and anticipate reopening in 2026.

The popular Timon of Athens is known to give gifts to his friends and hold great feasts, flaunting his wealth. But when he runs out of money and the creditors come calling, his friends turn him away. Director Peter J. Kuo uses Shakespeare's fable to explore income disparity and how wealth bestows status on members of communities of color, specifically Asian-Americans—and how quickly that status is revoked once the value of the of the "model minority" is exhausted.

Together, with Peaches Christ as our guide, let's explore the question: In these turbulent times, what does it mean to be an artist?

Life as a working artist can take its toll; it is important to take time for yourself. This one-hour experiential workshop offers practical tools to reduce stress, balance your energy, and connect with your creative center. Through simple breath and body-based practices, you'll be invited to turn inward—to quiet the noise around you and connect with your inner guidance to create a resilient, compassionate space within yourself—beyond labels, expectations, and external validation. AeJay Antonis Marquis

AeJay Antonis Marquis is a multi-hyphenate performance artist, scholar, educator, and activist whose work centers the decolonization of the theatrical canon, the black avantgarde, and queer political performance practice. Their current research seeks to explore Queer, Transgender and Non-Binary remixing, reclamation and reconciliation of varied Christian dogmas and mad liberation praxis through performative explorations in theatre and dance. Alongside their practice as a theatre and dance educator for a little over a decade, their work has been seen across the Bay Area performance landscape as a director, choreographer, actor, producer, and dramaturg and will continue to marry scholarship with practice in their doctoral journey and advocacy work. They are currently pursuing their PhD in Performance Studies at UC Berkeley. They are currently working on an original devised dance poetry piece based on Romare Beardon's collage Sunday After Sermon (1969) based on interviews with folks who identify as black, queer and on the baptimethocostal spectrum. This work will be presented with BACCE in February 2026.



Hope Mohr

Multidisciplinary artist and licensed California attorney Hope Mohr (she/her) works at the intersection of art and social change as a Fellow with the Sustainable Economies Law Center. After a professional dance career, she founded the nonprofit Hope Mohr Dance and its activist presenting program, The Bridge Project, which supported over 100 artists. In 2020, Mohr co-stewarded the organization's transition to an equity-driven, BIPOC-led model of distributed leadership and a new name: Bridge Live Arts. Her book, Shifting Cultural Power: Case Studies and Questions in Performance, was published in 2020 by the National Center for Choreography. As an artist working across dance, theater, visual art, and writing, Mohr explores feminism, gender, and sexuality. For over thirty years, she has made multidisciplinary performance that "conveys emotional and socio-political contents that ride just underneath the surface of a rigorous vocabulary." (Dance View Times). Her work has been presented throughout the U.S. in both theatrical contexts and also extensively in museums and galleries, from SFMOMA, to the Moody Center for the Arts in Houston, and 18th Street Arts Center in LA. She has been named to the YBCA 100 and also named as one of the "women" leaders" in dance by Dance Magazine editor-in-chief Wendy Perron.
